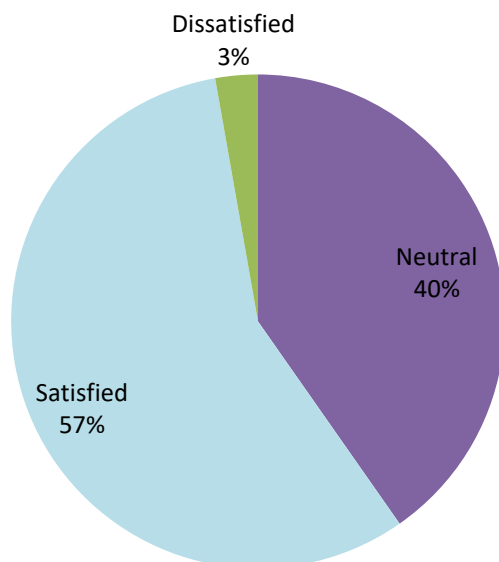

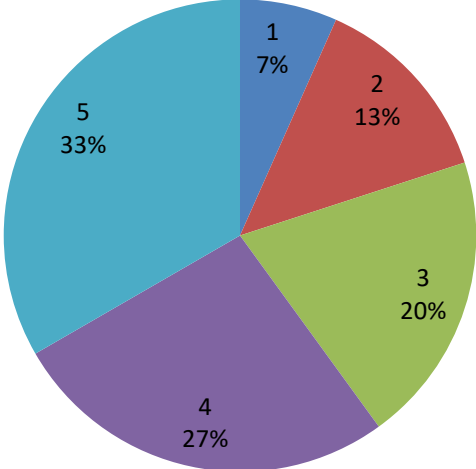
1. For the Academic Session 2023-24, are you satisfied with the overall Support from the institution for the smooth functioning of your class?

1. Overall Support from the institution



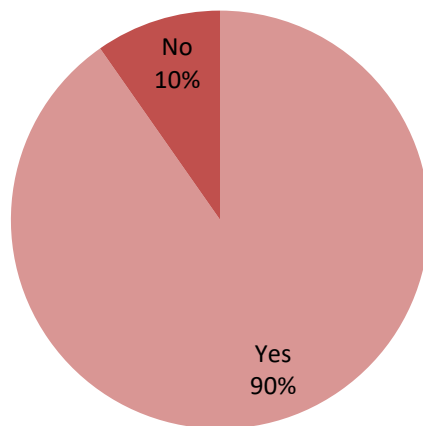
2. On learning perspective, how would you rank the Classroom learning? (5 being the highest and 1 being the lowest)

2. On learning perspective rank th Classroom learning



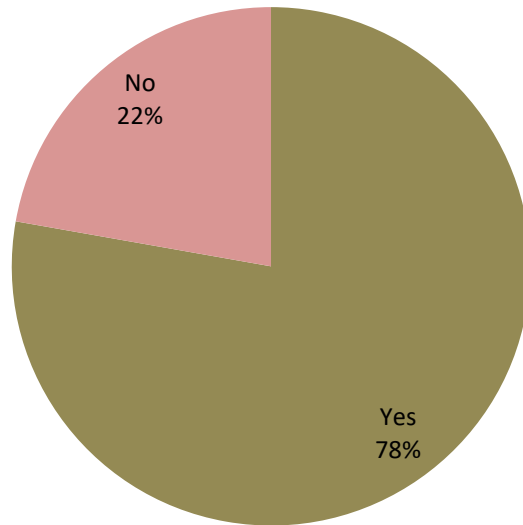
3. Are you satisfied with the internal evaluation system of the institute?

3. Are you satisfied with the internal evaluation system of the institute?



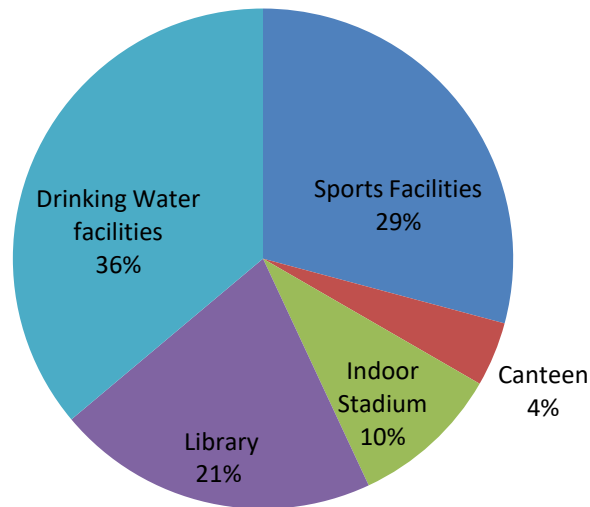
4. Are you satisfied with the Attendance Review System of the Institute?

4. Satisfied with the Attendance Review System



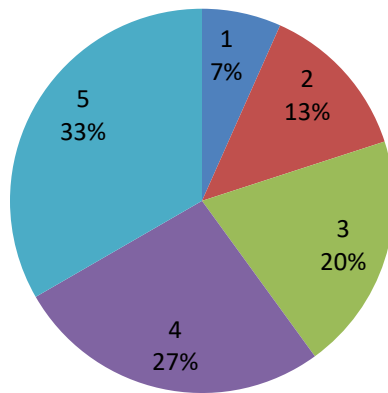
5. Are you satisfied with the following facility provided in the college?

5. Satisfied with the facility provided in the college



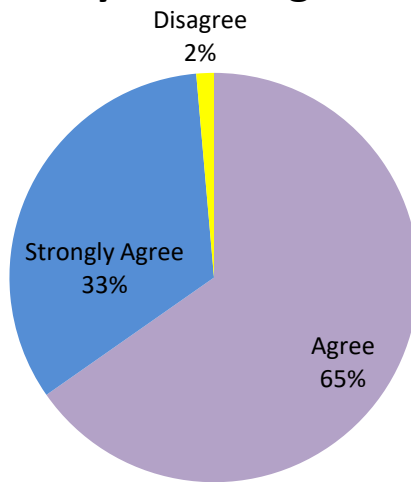

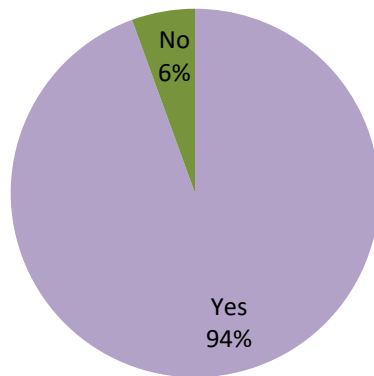
7. Will you agree that the student-teacher relation is good in your college?

7. Student-teacher relation is good in your college



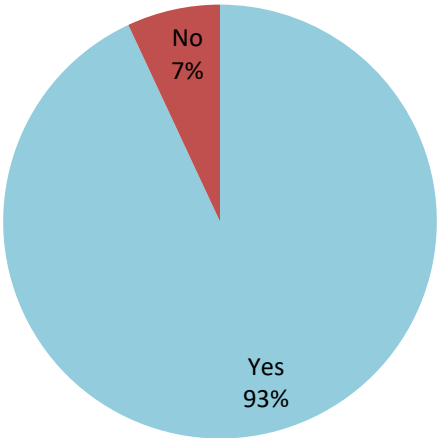
8. Do your teachers encourage you to participate in co-curricular and extra co-curricular activities?

8. Teachers encourage you to participate in co-curricular and extra co-curricular activities



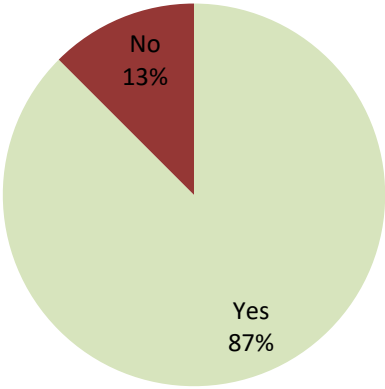
9. Do you think non-teaching staff in your college is helpful (related to payment of fees, scholarship application etc.)?

9. Non-teaching staff in your college is helpful



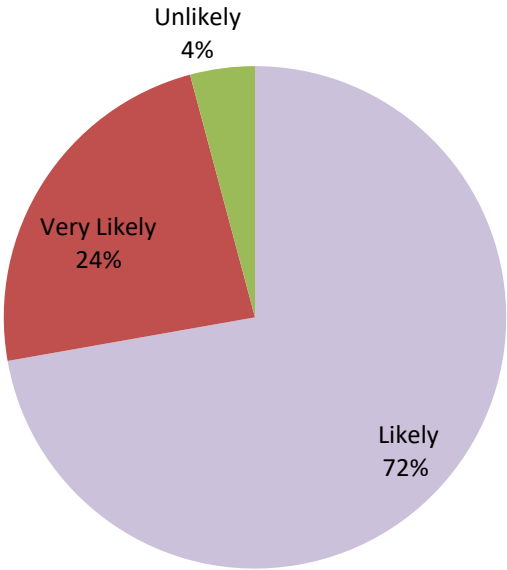
10. Do you think the Students' Care system in the college facilitates in your intellectual, social and emotional growth?

10. Students' Care system in the college facilitates in your intellectual, social and emotional growth



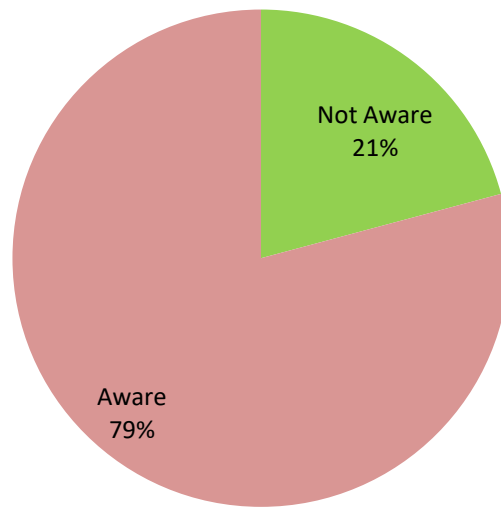
11. How likely are you to recommend this college to others?

11. Recommending the college to others



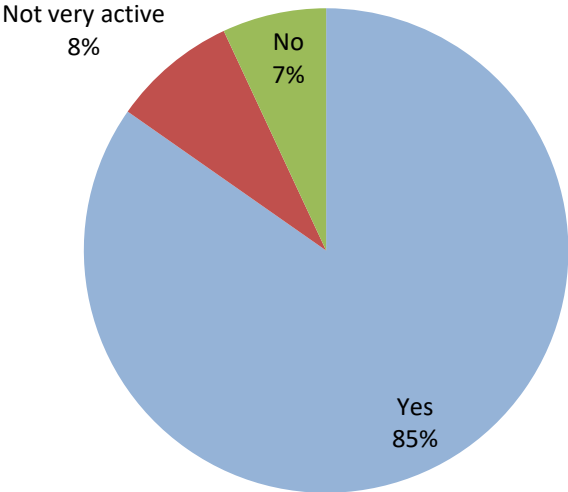

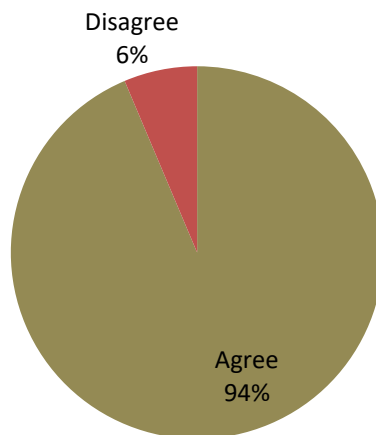

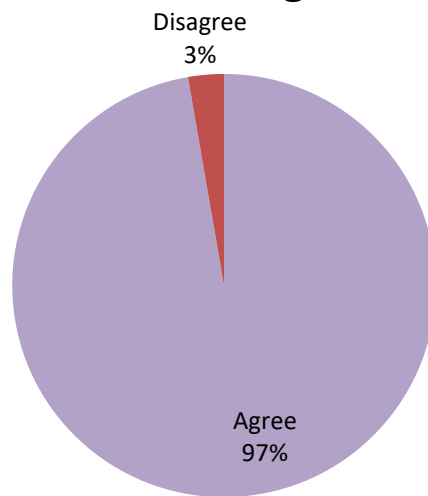

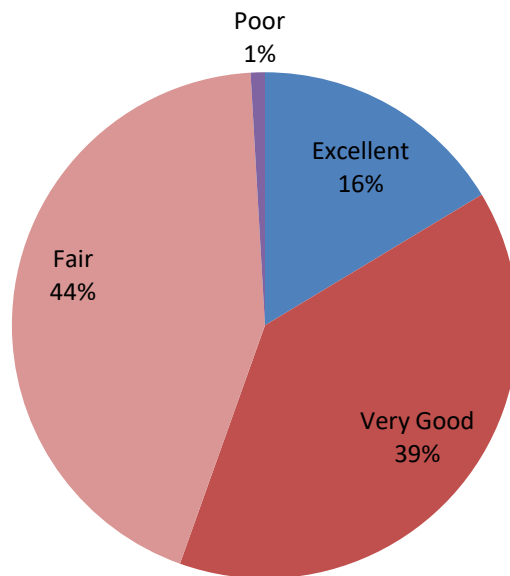

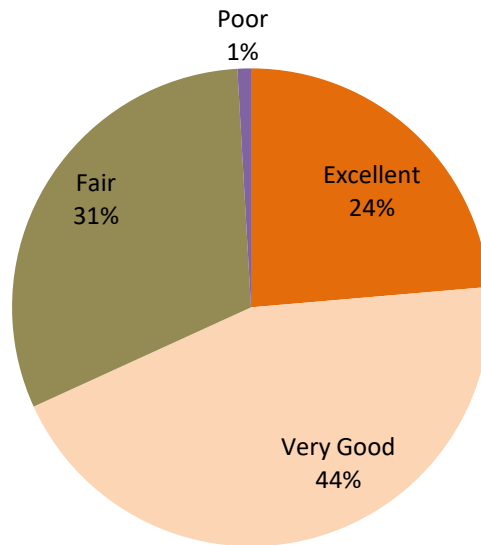

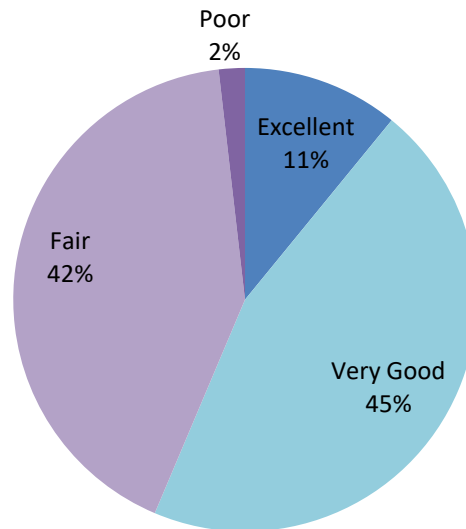
4. Course delivered by Teachers in the class.

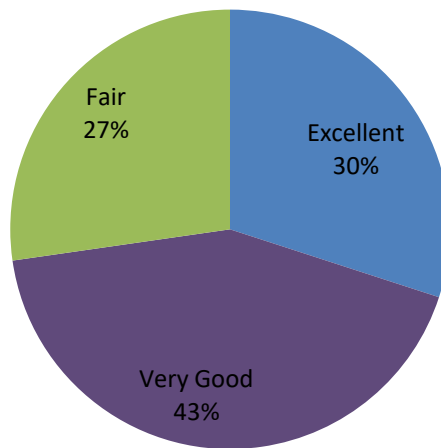
5. Usage of teaching aids and ICT in the class by Teachers to facilitate teaching.

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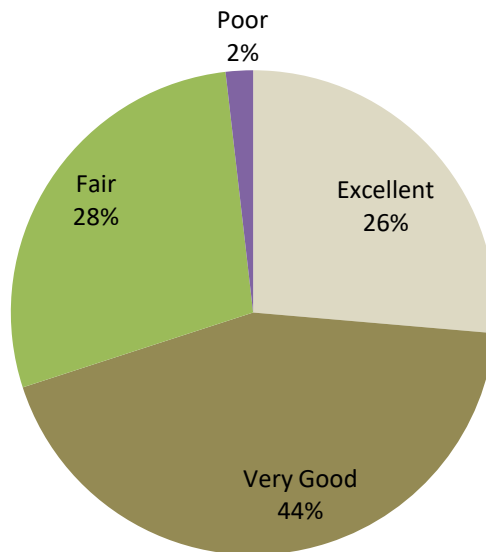

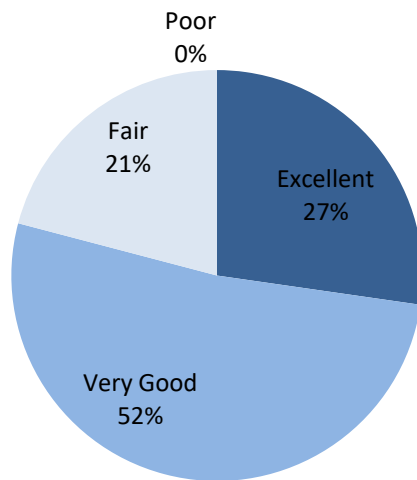
7. Accessibility of the teacher in and out of the classroom.

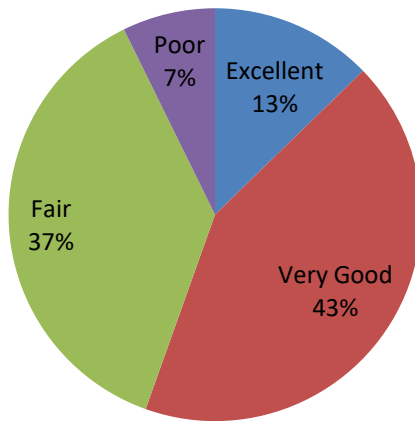
8. Depth of preparation and degree of knowledge of your teachers.

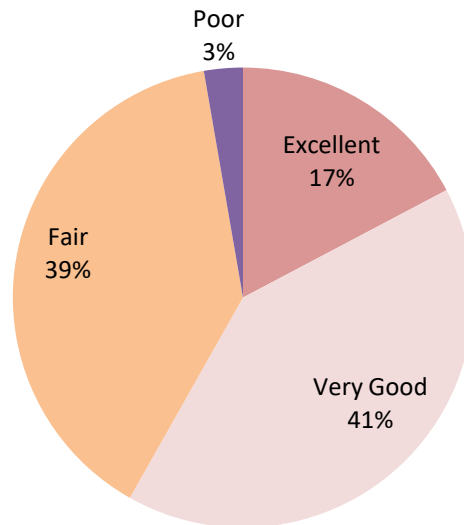

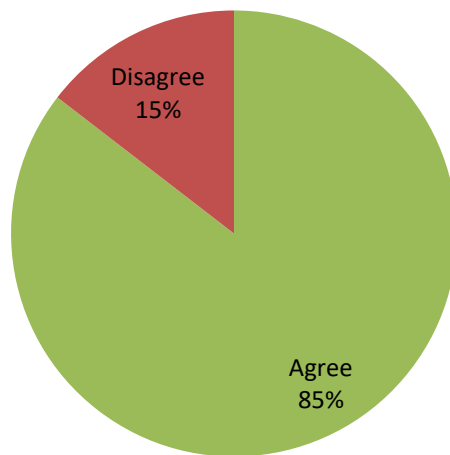

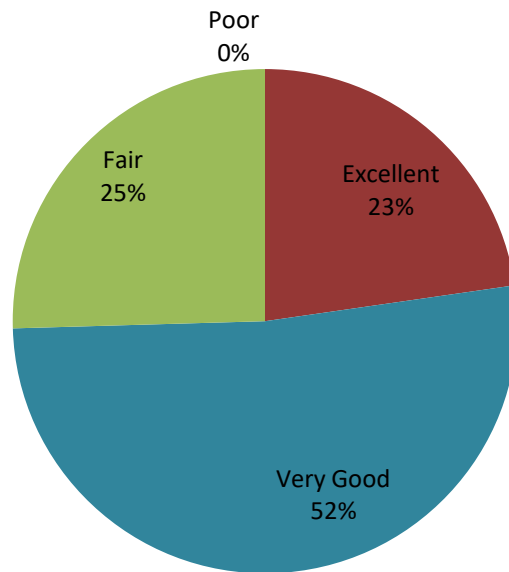
